



Dear Friends,

We are pleased to share with you our Annual Report for 2023, a year in which the Foundation was blessed with many new relationships and a nice rebound in the financial markets. We are honored to partner with donors and nonprofit organizations serving our communities of West Texas.

A few highlights from the past year:

- Grew our relationship with Rankin Education Foundation with a significant addition to an endowment supporting education programs and opportunities for the students of Rankin.
- Established a partnership with Alpine ISD to create the Alpine Public Education Fund, which financially supports areas of need not met by public funding.
- Awarded a second grant to The University of Texas Permian Basin for master planning and forward-looking development of the University's campus.
- Awarded more than \$16 million in grants to more than 200 nonprofits.

We have been closely following regulatory and legislative initiatives that impact charitable giving, especially in the area of donor advised funds. Along with our community foundation collegue, we have expressed our concerns and objections to efforts that would impede donors' decisions about their charitable giving. As of this printing, no such efforts have been legally implemented.

Our friends in the legal and financial communities have also been reminding us that, absent Congressional action, significant changes in the tax code will become effective January 1, 2026. Among these is the reversion to reduced estate and gift tax exemptions, which may suggest revisiting family estate planning decisions.

We are delighted to work with you as we continue to serve the Permian Basin and Trans-Pecos regions. Our mission is to connect people who care with causes that matter, and we welcome the opportunity to partner with donors and their professional advisors in creating customized plans that reflect donors' passions and values while optimizing tax and estate planning benefits.

Philanthropy


Permian Basin Area Foundation promotes and supports permanent philanthropy in our communities. PBAF stewards many types of giving. From designated funds to donor advised funds, we exist to meet charitable needs in West Texas by providing a flexible vehicle for donors with varied philanthropic desires.

Permian Basin Area Foundation accepts gifts of all varieties including:

- cash
- appreciated stock
- life insurance policies
- IRA distributions
- oil & gas interests
- other tangible property

All of these types of assets, and more, can be monetized and used for grantmaking.

Another way to support nonprofit organizations now and in the future is through a planned gift. Planned gifts help solidify the legacy and longevity of a nonprofit for generations to come. This can be achieved in a variety of ways such as a charitable remainder trust, charitable lead trust, or a simple charitable bequest. A professional advisor can help determine what makes the most sense for a donor's philanthropic and estate goals.





In 2023 Permian Basin Area Foundation and its donors awarded nonprofit organizations nearly \$16 million in grants. Of that, the Foundation awarded \$4.6 million through the semi-annual community grant cycle for nonprofits in the Permian Basin and Trans-Pecos regions.

Through undesignated and field of interest funds, the Foundation is able to support worthy nonprofits through our community grant cycle. A committee comprised of community volunteers reviews applications and financial information from 30-50 organizations each cycle. Committee recommendations are presented to our Board of Governors for final approval.

All other grants are awarded through donor recommendations and disbursements from designated and agency endowments.

In 2023 Permian Basin Area Foundation awarded more than nearly \$1 million in scholarships to more than 400 area students. There were seven new scholarship funds established last year to support students throughout West Texas.





Increase in Net Assets (Decrease)


